WORSHIP AT HOME

This time is an opportunity to be still, seeking to be aware of the presence of God within.

Carve out a time for this practice; prepare yourself, as you might for a usual Sunday morning and remember that there are others from the congregation gathering at the same time as you. There are also many from the church around the globe who are gathering to seek the presence of God as we are.

Prepare a space in the house; find a comfortable chair, light a candle, turn off distracting noises and close the door if that will help you to be still. This is something that does not need to be hurried.

We come to the Sunday before Christmas, which we mark with gratefulness and delight for the gift of love. We hear of the news that God's Christ will be born to Mary. This is both shocking news and cause for joy and jubilation – which Mary shares with her cousin Elizabeth.

We are invited to be people who, like Mary, wonder about the life of God coming to birth in surprising ways and unexpected places. This is the pattern for us as we long for the life of God to come to us.

The Gospel according to Luke 1. 26 – 53

In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin engaged to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary. And he came to her and said, 'Greetings, favoured one! The Lord is with you.' But she was

much perplexed by his words and pondered what sort of greeting this might be. The angel said to her, 'Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favour with God. And now, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you will name him Jesus. He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High, and the Lord God will give to him the throne of his ancestor David. He will reign over the house of Jacob for ever, and of his kingdom there will be no end.' Mary said to the angel, 'How can this be, since I am a virgin?' The angel said to her, 'The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you; therefore the child to be born will be holy; he will be called Son of God. And now, your relative Elizabeth in her old age has also conceived a son; and this is the sixth month for her who was said to be barren. For nothing will be impossible with God.' Then Mary said, 'Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word.' Then the angel departed from her.

In those days Mary set out and went with haste to a Judean town in the hill country, where she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth. When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the child leapt in her womb. And Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit and exclaimed with a loud cry, 'Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. And why has this happened to me, that the mother of my Lord comes to me? For as soon as I heard the sound of your greeting, the child in my womb leapt for joy. And blessed is she who believed that there would be a fulfilment of what was spoken to her by the Lord.'

And Mary said,
'My soul magnifies the Lord,

and my spirit rejoices in God my Saviour,

Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed;
for the Mighty One has done great things for me,
and holy is his name.

His mercy is for those who fear him

to Abraham and to his descendants for ever.'

Reflecting

Mary does what so many young, single women, who find themselves pregnant, have to do; hurry away to a relative, far away. Certainly this happened in the past; maybe not so much now. Luke tells us that Mary goes with haste after receiving the news from the angel. The pall of shame that the unwed, young mother would bring on her father's household and reputation would be too much. Away you go! Out of sight; out of mind.

But Mary stands in a tradition of faithful, assertive women who find the hand of God in their circumstances; circumstances which others would consider to be shameful and deserving of punishment. We should not forget that at the time of this story, the law permitted, indeed called for, the stoning of such a woman. But here in the midst of this threatening, repressive atmosphere Mary utters her hymn of praise, which we still utter, emulating her defiance and hopefulness.

My sense is that in the Protestant church we have to a great extent discounted Mary because Roman Catholics placed, what we thought, was a too great an emphasis on her. I can recall from childhood a kind of disdain for what has come to be called "Mary worship". Jesus alone was enough for us!

But like too many things as a result of the Reformations dating from the 16th Century, we put Mary as a figure of devotion away, out of sight. Mary was simply a sort of passive but necessary receptacle for the birthing of Jesus. But we have discounted her and continue to do so at our own loss. As we affirm that Jesus was both fully divine and fully human, we might look to the influences, the forces, the traditions which made him so fully human. The prime influence in Jesus' life, certainly that scripture gives us, is Mary. It is within her salty womb that Jesus grows. But it is also within the crucible of family that Jesus is formed, with the influence of cousins like Zechariah and Elizabeth, who can recognise the presence of the life of God in their vitals – the child leapt within me. This is a couple who are not crippled by shame but can see the life of God, even in the places that others consider to be beyond the pale. Some transformation has taken place in these people which enables them to abide in love, rather than fear. They have, of course, been visited by angels.

The Biblical greeting par excellence is: Fear not! It is what the messengers of God always say when they greet the human protagonist: Fear not!

'Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favour with God.' When Zechariah is alone in the temple and is greeted by the angel, Luke tells us that when Zechariah sees him, he is terrified; *fear overwhelmed him. But the angel said to him, 'Do not be afraid, Zechariah, for your prayer has been heard.* The shame of a pregnancy out of marriage, the shame of being childless are overcome with love as the angels bring greetings from God.

Last Saturday in The Age in the faith column there was a piece by Michael McGirr, the author of Doorways into Hope and Joy at Advent and Christmas, which some of us are dipping into again this Advent, delightful, playful, truly human prayers, opening doors of joy and hope for us. Michael was writing about angels. He writes:

I always thought that angels were the ones who looked after us. I can recall a time I was in hospital. On the night after my surgery, I fell over on my way to the bathroom. A nurse, whose name I never discovered, appeared from nowhere. It wasn't just that they were professional and saved me from embarrassment. It was that they spoke in a way that restored my peace and dignity. By daybreak they had finished work and I never saw them again.

That is my image of an angel; the person whose presence is beautiful and real but also beyond our grasp. Our community is slowly coming to appreciate the importance of such people.

I wonder who angels are? What they are really like. People have imaged them with wings for a long time. And maybe it is as though they wing their way to us, as though they come from somewhere else, from a place which is shaped by love rather than fear, by grace, rather than shame, by embrace, rather than exclusion. They are ones who see beneath the surface of things, into the possibility of the life of God present in what we may have been socialised to consider to be terrible circumstances. I think Michael is right when he suggests an angel is someone who restores peace and dignity. They restore us without any fuss, without any expectation that it's about them. They just do what they do, humbly, quietly, without the need to be acknowledged and awarded. We have all probably been touched by such a person and, in whatever it was that they did, they somehow reset the world for us – erased our fear, simply by their presence and some simple act.

While Mary carries new life within her, this new life could be a death sentence for her. Gabriel restores her dignity; and Mary sings a hymn of feminine defiance in an oppressive male world. Elizabeth welcomes her as an angel; a bearer of God and affirms the presence of God in this most vital of human moments.

Through Advent we are called to wait and be watchful for the coming of God. As we remember the historical birth of Jesus we also recognise that in his story there is an opening of our eyes to an eternal pattern in our temporal being; a breaking in of the immortal to our mortal realm. This birth was not just a one-off event a long time ago but a pattern that is eternal. And we are invited to be part of this eternal realm. And so, we make the Advent cry: Come, Lord Jesus!

Saviour God, we bring to you our prayers for your church.

You brought your church into being and commissioned us to bear your love to the world: help us, as individuals, as a congregation and as a denomination to remain faithful to our calling. May we recognise the stirrings of new life within, being open to your call to enter into new ministries and to step out in faith into new ventures, so that we can play our part in revealing the mystery of your coming and in proclaiming your glory in all the world.
