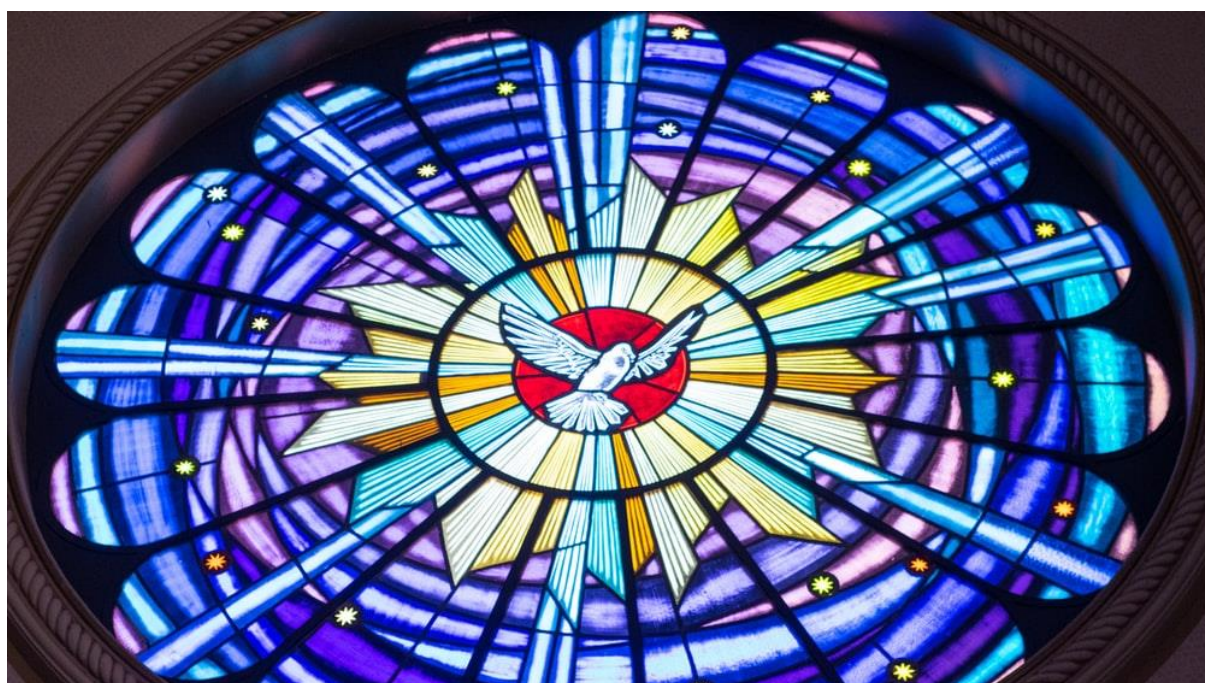

5Therefore, since we are justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, 2through whom we have obtained access to this grace in which we stand; and we boast in our hope of sharing the glory of God. 3And not only that, but we also boast in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, 4and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, 5and hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us.

## Reflection

### By Grace Alone

It is around the year 1515, and a young Augustinian friar prays in his cell. He prays again ... and again. He is close to panicking. His sin overwhelms him. He is wracked with regret. He wants to make amends, to set things right, to start again, to be renewed — but nothing works.

He looks back, but it's like staring into a dark pit. He tries to look forward, but all he can see is more of the same. His church urges him to try harder, to challenge evil with a life of good works — and he applies his considerable talents as scholar, as linguist, as musician to the task, but nothing works. Friar Martin is at his wits end.

Martin searches his Bible for an answer. Surely there must be an answer...somewhere. He happens on Paul's letter to the Romans. He's read it often, but he struggles with it again. Then, one of those lightbulb moments. How could he have missed it?

### **We are justified by faith**

and again

### **God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit**

There it was. Again and again. Put in the simplest contemporary terms: we are loved — we just are. We simply need to be aware of it. That's the essence of Faith; being aware. Getting the message, and living accordingly. This love is not, cannot be, earned. On reading these words our life-task changes from the desperate quest for virtue, to the living of a life in the manner of one who is loved — and as one who is an instrument of love.

Nobody wants to hang out with a goody-goody — with a perfect person. God forbid! Much better to hang out with a person who understands his or her place in the grand scheme of things. We don't want to hang out with a super-efficient manager, but with someone who will love us to pieces, because they are loved — unconditionally.

Martin Luther's personal problem was solved, but Martin did not become a perfect human being. Martin had his failings. The one with which we find it most difficult to come to terms is his dislike of Jews. Martin wanted the Jews to be persecuted, to be done away with, and he advised the powers to be to act accordingly. Does that sound familiar? Some five hundred years later, Adolf Hitler took comfort from Luther's antisemitism.

Of course, God's grace does not give us leave to do what we like. Luther had a blind spot. We all have blind spots, and God's love does not let us off from engaging in thorough-going self examination. We have responsibility — to ourselves and to each other. God's love enables us, but does not excuse us. God's love liberates us, but does not make it OK to do anything at all. God's love does not remove from us the need to adhere to a code of ethics. God's love does not make such words as virtue, goodness, compassion and solidarity meaningless. We need to live up to God's love. People want to see the fruits of God's love.

But let me step back for a moment. Luther did not have just a personal problem, he had a social problem too. Luther noted that the church of his time had lost sight of the principle of Sola Gratia (grace alone). It had taken upon itself the authority to be the dispenser of God's Grace. It had literally taken the love of God out of God's hands. One thing had led to another, and the Church had decided that it even had the right to sell that love in small packets — in the form of get-out-of-Purgatory-free cards, otherwise known as "indulgences". Luther was scandalised, and he put his objections in writing and nailed them to the door of the Cathedral at Wittenberg. That set the cats among the pigeons! It wasn't so much that the Church objected to the asking of questions and the raising of issues. The Church's theologians had always done that. What the Church authorities objected to was the obvious tone of revolution. Luther wanted things to change. Luther was not making some fine clever theological points. Luther was saying the status quo was WRONG.

Well, we know with the benefit of hindsight what happened. The Church's authority was undermined. The difference between authority and opinion was blurred. Not only was the Church radically changed, but the social world changed as well, and the door opened to what is called "The Enlightenment", and the social world we up to very recently inhabited.

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In the early 20th Century a young Pastor in Switzerland also struggled with the notion of God's Grace. Karl Barth was a member of a church that was heir to Luther's reformation. A Protestant, in other words. Barth noted that the Protestant churches, in particular, had tended to look to social trends to shape their ideas of how and when God works in the world. In other words, there had become a marriage between society and church. No longer did the church stand outside society and stand in judgement of that society, but there had developed a cosy relationship between them. An extreme example was when Hitler decided to establish a German Church, and to invite the existing churches to sign up. The State would appoint the office-bearers (Bishops) and take part in the church's governance. In this way the church would become an arm of the State.

Some theologians saw the danger in this and refused to sign up. The Confessing Church, of which Barth had become a member (along with Dietrich Bonhoeffer) was one of the few dissident churches. Barth was instrumental in drafting what was to become known as the Barmen Declaration which declared that God called the shots, that He broke into our lives as an act of pure grace, that he stands in judgement of principalities and powers, and that the Christian owes allegiance to Him and Him alone.

Barth made sure that a copy of the Barmen Declaration reached Hitler. Subsequently, Bart had to leave Germany and take refuge in Switzerland, his home country. Bonhoeffer was later executed for taking part in the attempt to assassinate Hitler.

If ever there was a sense that God's Grace is not an easy grace, it is in the experience of the church under duress in the early years of the twentieth century.

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Luther and Barth are examples of Grace at work. These two, and many others, have seen that "the faith" is not about being virtuous; not about always doing the right thing; not about social justice; not about always being good.

The Christian community is a beloved community — always loved and always loving. And the love we speak about is always the gracious love of God; given freely, unrequested, not the result of our virtuous lives, but that which makes virtue possible and virtue visible.

God's gracious love is the sign and seal of our faith. Not just for Luther. Not just for Barth. It is the gracious sign and seal of this community — here in Ormond. It has consequences. With it we will go forward. Without it we will be lost.

May it be so.
