STORY TELLING AND STORY LISTENING

From the Hebrew Scriptures – Jeremiah 20.7-13

O Lord, you have enticed me, and I was enticed; you have overpowered me, and you have prevailed. I have become a laughingstock all day long, everyone mocks me. ⁸ For whenever I speak, I must cry out; I must shout, "Violence and destruction!" For the word of the Lord has become for me a reproach and derision all day long. ⁹ If I say, "I will not mention him or speak any more in his name," then within me there is something like a burning fire shut up in my bones; I am weary with holding it in, and I cannot. ¹⁰ For I hear many whispering: "Terror is all around! Denounce him! Let us denounce him!" All my close friends are watching for me to stumble. "Perhaps he can be enticed and we can prevail against him and take our revenge on him."

¹¹ But the Lord is with me like a terrifying warrior; therefore my persecutors will stumble, and they will not prevail. They will be greatly shamed for they will not succeed. Their eternal dishonour will never be forgotten.

¹² O Lord of hosts, you test the righteous; you see the heart and the mind; let me see your retribution upon them, for to you I have committed my cause. ¹³ Sing to the Lord; praise the Lord! For he has delivered the life of the needy from the hands of evildoers.

From the Gospels - Good News according to Matthew 10.24-39

²⁴ "A disciple is not above the teacher nor a slave above the master; ²⁵ it is enough for the disciple to be like the teacher and the slave like the master. If they have called the master of the house Beelzebul, how much more will they malign those of his household!

Whom to Fear

²⁶ "So have no fear of them, for nothing is covered up that will not be uncovered and nothing secret that will not become known.²⁷ What I say to you in the dark, tell in the light, and what you hear whispered, proclaim from the housetops. ²⁸ Do not fear those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; rather, fear the one who can destroy both soul and body in hell. ²⁹ Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground apart from your Father. ³⁰ And even the hairs of your head are all counted. ³¹ So do not be afraid; you are of more value than many sparrows. ³² "Everyone, therefore, who acknowledges me before others, I also will acknowledge before my Father in heaven, ³³ but whoever denies me before others, I also will deny before my Father in heaven.

Not Peace, but a Sword

³⁴ "Do not think that I have come to bring peace to the earth; I have not come to bring peace but a sword. ³⁵ For I have come to set a man against his father, and a daughter against her mother, and a daughter in-law against her mother-in-law, ³⁶ and one's foes will be members of one's own household.

³⁷ "Whoever loves father or mother more than me is not worthy of me, and whoever loves son or daughter more than me is not worthy of me, ³⁸ and whoever does not take up the cross and follow me is not worthy of me. ³⁹ Those who find their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it.

Walter Wangerin tells of accompanying his church's youth choir on a singing tour and sharing the group's talents in an unlikely, frightening place — the Colorado Women's Penitentiary:

Holy, holy, holy. Who suckered us into this?

One by one, male and female, we were patted down while our arms drooped out like chicken wings: pits, waist, back and stomach, crotch and legs. I was the first man frisked. The first woman came forward shivering as though she'd swallowed a raw and living fish. "Ohhh! That was terrible!"

The auditorium was a great cement room in which all sound was as alive and clean as a guitar string... Cheryl, louder than she intended, called the choir to position and to practise in its little space.

But who would listen to us? And of those who did, what would they care?

Would they scorn us? Sneer in the face of our earnest offering?... Cheryl raised her arms before our multi-coloured choir, intending to practise a piece, to measure the sound of the place. Hollis hit a chord. And then stark wonder began...

It wasn't even time yet for the concert to begin. No introductions had been made, either by voice or music, and this was not our program. Yet the women were coming, and the practise piece drew a smattering of applause, and Cheryl was lost.

By fitful habit she led the choir into another piece for practise, "Soon, and very soon, we are going to meet the king." Oh, the choir swung hard and speedily against its beat and Timmy simply hid himself in the solo, and the women laughed at our abandon, and behold: the song itself, it took us over! The nerves left us, and we too began to laugh as we sang, as though there were some huge joke afoot, and we were grateful for the freedom in our throats, and we looked, for the first time, on one another, nodding, slapping another's back, singing!

And the women took to clapping, some of them dancing with their faces to the floor, their shoulders hunched, and they filled the place with their constant arrival, and sometime — no one knew when —the practise turned into an honest concert...

Song after song, the women stood up and beat their palms together. And they wept, sometimes. Timmy can do that to you.

And at one point the entire auditorium, choir and criminals together, joined hands and lifted those hands and rocked and sang, "Oh, How I Love Jesus." My God, how you break the bars! How you fling open the doors that imprison and divide us!

Loving and merciful God, you offer your people redemption and fullness of life: we pray for your church.
