

Gospel Reading: Matthew 14: 13-21 Robyn Mulder

- ¹³When Jesus heard what had happened, he withdrew by boat privately to a solitary place. Hearing of this, the crowds followed him on foot from the towns. ¹⁴When Jesus landed and saw a large crowd, he had compassion on them and healed their sick.
- ¹⁵ As evening approached, the disciples came to him and said, "This is a remote place, and it's already getting late. Send the crowds away, so they can go to the villages and buy themselves some food."
- ¹⁶ Jesus replied, "They do not need to go away. You give them something to eat."
- ¹⁷ "We have here only five loaves of bread and two fish," they answered.
- ¹⁸ "Bring them here to me," he said. ¹⁹ And he directed the people to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves and the two fish and looking up to heaven, he gave thanks and broke the loaves. Then he gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the people. ²⁰ They all ate and were satisfied, and the disciples picked up twelve basketfuls of broken pieces that were left over. ²¹ The number of those who ate was about five thousand men, besides women and children.

On Sufficiency

"The Insufficient life is what prevails in most of the world today. Lacking something is not uncommon to the majority of people. Insufficiency becomes a part of their life." said Rev Gospel Ralte, from the Gippsland Presbytery recentlyⁱⁱⁱ. And as a Sri Lankan Uniting Church minister, he should know from first hand experience of his home country. And what a wonderful first name to have, Gospel! And despite the poverty in his background, he is an enthusiastic Christian, who sings and plays guitar with gusto!

Everyone desires to have a full life, with enough for our needs. When we are in the situation of lacking something we truly need, the worry, the stress and wandering thoughts and the generally insecure feeling confronts us and could lead us to despair and hopelessness. In this situation of lack, what shall we do? Where shall we turn to for help? Let us look at the sufficiency of supply that the crowds and the disciples of Jesus had experienced in the first century, and see what we can learn from it today.

The story today begins with Jesus grieving over the recent death of his cousin and good friend, the prophet John the Baptist. John had been beheaded while in the prison of Herod Antipas, this Herod being one of Herod the Great's grandsons. In a drunken party, Herod stupidly promised his niece Salome whatever she asked for, and at the behest of her mother Herodias, Salome asked for John the Baptist to be killed, and his head to be brough in on a platter. Herodias was not only Herod Antipas' brother Phillip's ex-wife, she was also Herod's half-niece! So it was definitely an incestuous type of relationship which John had clearly pointed out to both of them. So Herodias wanted to silence her critic John. And she did, by arranging for his murder.

Jesus found out some days after the event, while he was in Galilee, which was a long way away. So Jesus was unable to get back in time for his cousin John's funeral, as it would have been held within 24 hours of his death. So as you can imagine, Jesus must have been very distressed at John's death AND for not being able to attend his funeral or comfort his family or be comforted by them. So his first reaction is to want to be alone, to turn to God in prayer to be sustained in his grief. And clearly

Jesus was supported and uplifted, because it was not long after than he returned to minister to the crowds nearby.

So point 1, if prayer is important to Jesus in order to be sustained by God in times of grief, loss, pain and distress, then so it should be for us, Jesus' disciples. Prayer is one of the main ways of being sustained and helped by God.

Next, as I said, Jesus saw the needs of the people in the crowd and had compassion for them. And for him, compassion meant more than simply saying "I will pray for you'. He was practical and cured their sick people. And then as it grew late in the afternoon and into the evening, he became aware that people were getting hungry. The crowd's leaders thought the solution was to send the people away to the surrounding villages to buy food. But Jesus said, "NO, you feed them." And they said, "But we haven't got enough! We only have five loaves and two fishes, for all these 5000+ people! Impossible!" They felt they lacked sufficiency.

Jesus' answer was to ask the crowd to sit down, and then he prayed and blessed the food, and asked that it be shared out. And it was MORE than enough, more than sufficient! There were even 12 baskets full of left overs! Yes, a miracle by Jesus, we might say. And it was a miracle that one person shared their only lunch of loaves and fishes with faith, rather than with knowledge ahead of time that everyone would be blessed and fed by Jesus. And you can probably hear the echoes of our Holy Communion in the way this story is told.

It is the same today. We disciples may need healing like the crowd did. We may need the basics of life like food, water, power and shelter. But together, blessed by God, and by being willing to share what we have, even when we think it is so little or insufficient, yet under God's blessing, it will be enough.

Thirdly, these principles also apply to us as congregations today. Often the biggest sense of need we have is that we do not have enough <u>people</u> to be or to do what we think needs to be done to be a congregation. So how is our need for people to be met? Firstly, through prayer. Pray for more members of your congregation. Secondly, to take action, by caring for one another. And thirdly, by being willing to offer what we have, even if that seems to be little. I would like to show the first part of a short video by Rev Deacon Mat Harry, the New and Renewing Congregations staff person in the Vic-Tas Synod. Mat demonstrates some different examples of being part of a congregation and how we might build that in our space. He calls it being a Mixed Economy Church."

So today as we celebrate Holy Communion, I would like you to be aware of being blessed and fed by God, and secondly, to ask God to show you what are the "loaves and fishes" of blessing that God has already given you, and how you might offer them to be blessed and multiplied by God, for everyone's blessing. What new thing might God be asking of you?

Christ has died. Christ is risen Christ will come again.

Pour out the Holy Spirit on us and on these gifts of bread and wine that they may be for us the body and blood of Christ and that we may be for you the Body of Christ in the world. Make us one with him, one with each other, and one in ministry in the world feasting together now and always.

We pray together in the language and traditions of our hearts: Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name,

your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven.

Give us today our daily bread.
