Your Word, O God is a lamp to our feet, and a light to our path

#### From the First Testament - Genesis 37:1-4, 12-28

<sup>37:1</sup> Jacob settled in the land where his father had lived as an alien, the land of Canaan. <sup>37:2</sup> This is the story of the family of Jacob. Joseph, being seventeen years old, was shepherding the flock with his brothers; he was a helper to the sons of Bilhah and Zilpah, his father's wives; and Joseph brought a bad report of them to their father. <sup>37:3</sup> Now Israel loved Joseph more than any other of his children, because he was the son of his old age; and he had made him a long robe with sleeves. <sup>37:4</sup> But when his brothers saw that their father loved him more than all his brothers, they hated him, and could not speak peaceably to him.

<sup>37:12</sup> Now his brothers went to pasture their father's flock near Shechem. <sup>37:13</sup> And Israel said to Joseph, "Are not your brothers pasturing the flock at Shechem? Come, I will send you to them." He answered, "Here I am." <sup>37:14</sup> So he said to him, "Go now, see if it is well with your brothers and with the flock; and bring word back to me." So he sent him from the valley of Hebron. He came to Shechem, <sup>37:15</sup> and a man found him wandering in the fields; the man asked him, "What are you seeking?" <sup>37:16</sup> "I am seeking my brothers," he said; "tell me, please, where they are pasturing the flock." <sup>37:17</sup> The man said, "They have gone away, for I heard them say, 'Let us go to Dothan.'" So Joseph went after his brothers and found them at Dothan.

<sup>37:18</sup> They saw him from a distance, and before he came near to them, they conspired to kill him. <sup>37:19</sup> They said to one another, "Here comes this dreamer. <sup>37:20</sup> Come now, let us kill him and throw him into one of the pits; then we shall say that a wild animal has devoured him, and we shall see what will become of his dreams. <sup>37:21</sup> But when Reuben heard it, he delivered him out of their hands, saying, "Let us not take his life." <sup>37:22</sup> Reuben said to them, "Shed no blood; throw him into this pit here in the wilderness, but lay no hand on him" - that he might rescue him out of their hand and restore him to his father.

<sup>37:23</sup> So when Joseph came to his brothers, they stripped him of his robe, the long robe with sleeves that he wore; <sup>37:24</sup> and they took him and threw him into a pit. The pit was empty; there was no water in it. <sup>37:25</sup> Then they sat down to eat; and looking up they saw a caravan of Ishmaelites coming from Gilead, with their camels carrying gum, balm, and resin, on their way to carry it down to Egypt. <sup>37:26</sup> Then Judah said to his brothers, "What profit is it if we kill our brother and conceal his blood? <sup>37:27</sup> Come, let us sell him to the Ishmaelites, and not lay our hands on him, for he is our brother, our own flesh." And his brothers agreed. <sup>37:28</sup> When some Midianite traders passed by, they drew Joseph up, lifting him out of the pit, and sold him to the Ishmaelites for twenty pieces of silver. And they took Joseph to Egypt.

#### From the New Testament - Matthew 14:22-33

<sup>14:22</sup> Immediately he made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side, while he dismissed the crowds. <sup>14:23</sup> And after he had dismissed the crowds, he went up the mountain by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, <sup>14:24</sup> but by this time the boat, battered by the waves, was far from the land, for the wind was against them. <sup>14:25</sup> And early in the morning he came walking toward them on the sea. <sup>14:26</sup> But when the disciples saw him walking on the sea, they were terrified, saying, "It is a ghost!" And they cried out in fear. <sup>14:27</sup> But immediately Jesus spoke to them and said, "Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid." <sup>14:28</sup> Peter answered him, "Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water." <sup>14:29</sup> He said, "Come." So Peter got out of the boat, started walking on the water, and came toward Jesus. <sup>14:30</sup> But when he noticed the strong wind, he became frightened, and beginning to sink, he cried out, "Lord, save me!" <sup>14:31</sup> Jesus immediately reached out his hand and caught him, saying to him, "You of little faith, why did you doubt?" <sup>14:32</sup> When they got into the boat, the wind ceased. <sup>14:33</sup> And those in the boat worshiped him, saying, "Truly you are the Son of God."

## Reflection on the testimonies from Scripture ...

The Scripture stories of recent weeks have a number of references to the discovery of and encounters with God in unexpected places and circumstances. Some years ago, the Revd Bruce Prewer wrote 'Australian Psalms' about these unimagined possible encounters and presences of God in Jesus. As Joseph enters into a forced exile away for the country where he knows God dwells, and Matthew raises serious questions about faith and trust and the presence of God, this Psalm of Bruce's' bears reflection:

On this faith journey, we are pilgrims too easily seduced by the self-centred contemporary culture: Surely the Lord is in this place, but we did not know it.

Passing by refugees in the holding compounds in Darwin, Port Headland, and Woomera: Surely the Lord was in this place, but we did not know it.

Touring the green grounds and ruins of Port Arthur where suffering and grief have twice abounded: Surely the Lord is in this place, but we did not know it.

Among the scapegoats, queuing at Centrelink counters and making endless futile job applications: Surely the Lord is in this place, but we did not know it.

Out of sight, behind pubs or in the alleys and park toilets, where drugs and needles proliferate: Surely the Lord is in this place, but we did not know it.

Wherever other congregations and pastors practise a religious style that we personally find off-putting: Surely the Lord is in this place, but we did not know it.

In Canberra, with those brave Christians who by sheer faith and hope endure the compromises of the political process: Surely the Lord is in this place, but we did not know it.

In the very familiar ordinariness or our own local church, where we share the pews with folk who are boring sinners like us: Surely the Lord is in this place, but we did not know it.

Spirit of God, more present and real and sane than we ever are, enable us to know you more surely, to love you more eagerly, and to serve you more joyfully, now and to the end of the world. Amen

Loving Friend, we pray for our bruised and weeping neighbours: those just made redundant, pained by divorce, grieving over a delinquent child, or weeping hot tears at a grave. Bring comfort, hope, faith and love.

And for ourselves as we seek to follow you through all the storms and distractions of our lives.

When we are tempted to add our noise to the shouting of opinions and doctrines, teach us O Christ, the art of quiet proclamation.

When we face the crashing of guns and missiles in our world, and allow justifications of violence; when we are overwhelmed by the wails of those who grieve and suffer, and by the white noise of those who deny the world's pain, teach us O Christ, the art of quiet proclamation.

When we are lured by the song of materialism, and lulled by the lullaby of the immediate and the expedient, teach us O Christ, the art of quiet proclamation.

In all the places where your love and justice are unheard, where the song of your Grace is silenced, and where the noise of sin, robs people of life, teach us, to hear the whispers of your reign, and to quietly, gently, persistently, proclaim your gospel in love, word and action.
